A sense of community can make the difference between a thriving neighborhood and a decaying one in an area like the Wilbur section of Trenton. Known for years as a struggling city, Trenton has experienced cutbacks and loss of services in recent years that have led to even higher crime rates and greater poverty. Communities need to be proactive and self-aware in order to survive and hopefully, grow. **Bi-monthly community meetings at BCHT** are starting to make a difference in the Wilbur community. Since October 2013, neighbors have been gathering to **discuss issues and create solutions to make the community a better place to live.** The neighborhood has become **proactive by sponsoring community events and cleanups**.

Making Greg Grant Park An Asset

Neighbors see the new Greg Grant Park on East State Street as a focal point in the community. They realize that the park can be an asset only if it is kept up and there are events that attract neighborhood children and adults. To accomplish this, neighbors have planned **movie nights and block parties for the summer** and have taken responsibility for cleaning the park.

The Brian McCormick Homeowners Association (HOA) has officially adopted the park and is responsible for keeping it clean. Eastward Councilwoman Reynolds-Jackson donated rakes, bags, and gloves and helped organize a community cleanup.
